ARK Education Program Updates

Animal Rescue Kare recently completed our 2024 education and enrichment initiative. Along with providing info about ARK's work in the community, students at all 5 Hart County grade schools were treated to a program featuring a high-flying canine show from Performance Dogs of Ohio. The dogs in the show are all rescues – showing just how amazing rescues can be. A huge thanks to the schools for helping make this a reality. ARK's new youth mascot, Munford, made his debut



and was an instant celebrity. A special thanks to Crystal Hughes and Madison Dennis for bringing Munford to life.

The ARK Youth Ambassador program has evolved. To accurately reflect the mission and outreach of this dynamic group, the

ARK Youth Ambassadors will now be re-named as the "ARK Youth Corps." ARK's Youth Corps has invested nearly 400 hours of

community service in the last year, including a recent adoption event for the

Hart County Animal Shelter at the Munfordville TSC. Among their other duties, they help socialize the shelter dogs, which make them more adoptable. It has really paid off with many successful adoptions.

ARK's Youth Corps is piloting a program called the "Service Pup Academy." Youth Corps member Anna Scott is fostering and training Whiskey, a pup rescued from the KY 357 shelter. Anna is receiving her training certification from the Victoria Stillwell Academy under the guidance of Autumn Reynolds, of Autumn Rose Dog Training. The ARK Service Pup Academy will train and foster young service dogs through the AKC Good Citizenship level of training. Once completed, the certified dogs will join a service training group for further development. This project is underwritten by the HeartPaws Foundation. We are very grateful for their support. Susan Rowe brought the meeting to order by greeting all the guests and introducing the ARK Board of Directors and board candidates. The committee chairs gave reports about their programs. Susan Rowe discussed the upcoming Dawgy Dash 5K, ARK's main fundraiser of the year. Janet Kistler presented the treasurer's report, (which can be found on our website.)

Karen Klettner has recently taken over the role of SNR chair. She gave a brief summary of our plans for the coming year including an SNR event every 3 months. We are very grateful to have Riverside Animal Clinic, the Leitchfield Veterinary Clinic, and Barren River Animal Welfare

Association partnering with us for all our programs.

Alethea Dudley and her children brought heart-warming stories about some of the challenges they have dealt with in the foster program. Our pet foster homes are doing their best to help homeless and surrendered kitties. (See one story on page 3.)

Bonnie Moore presented a slide show of the Trap-Neuter-Return program and gave a shout out to her team of trappers and haulers. They work hard to help feral cat colonies. The team also has a barn cat program to take care of cats who must be removed from their original location. They tackle it all with determination and good humor.

Ron Gonterman, shelter liaison, explained ARK's role with the HCAS – to provide support and to help with material needs. He also gave a brief history of ARK from its inception to date. He is leaving the Board but will continue to volunteer. Alicia McClure is taking over the role of liaison.

Tony Roberts, Hart County Animal Shelter director gave an update on the shelter. Weekly, they have about 47 stray dogs in their two facilities. (one near the fairgrounds and one on Hwy 357) 513 dogs were processed in 2023, with 313 adopted/transported out. Dogs have been adopted as far away as Canada and Boston. One good dog is being trained as a service dog by an ARK youth volunteer. They are planning to build a bigger shelter that is more functional in the future. He introduced the shelter staff. They are doing a terrific job for the needy dogs in our area.

Trap-Neuter-Return Program Going Strong

The ARK TNR is growing with volunteers which is great, because the county is unfortunately growing in feral cats. We have broken Hart County down to 3 areas: Bonnieville, Cub Run and Munfordville: Hardyville, Magnolia and Canmer: and Horse Cave. We have 1 trapper and 2

transporters for each area.

So far this year, we have trapped 56 kitties, 34 of them are females. If we hadn't trapped these females, they could have had litters numbering up to 140 kittens per quarter. The time to TNR the kitty is when it shows up, not after it's had time to start breeding.

We have taken 26 kitties to work as barn cats on farms. Let us know if you want some fixed barn cats by filling out the form on our website home page.

We are still looking for someone with a truck or van that can take 10-15 kitties to and from Leitchfield Animal Clinic on Tuesdays. If you're interested in helping with the TNR Team, go on our website and fill out the volunteer form. We try to rotate so you may volunteer one or two days a month. Bonnie Moore, TNR Coordinator
